Montague Cohen was born in London, England and obtained his B.Sc. (Physics) and Ph.D. (Medical Physics) from London University. Before coming to Canada in 1975, he worked at the London Hospital in London and the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna. He was appointed Director of McGill's Medical Physics Unit in 1979 and has cross-appointments in Physics and Radiology. He is also Hon. Curator of the Rutherford Museum, Chairman of a Task Group of the International Commission on Radiological Units and Measurements, and a consultant on radiation safety to the Ontario Government.

Davena Davis has been the Rare Books Cataloguer for about ten years. Prior to that she worked in the Acquisitions Department of the Humanities and Social Sciences Library and the Law Library (McGill University). During the academic year 1987-1988, she was a lecturer in the Faculty of Religious Studies. She has, in addition to a M.L.S., a Master's degree in Classics and a Ph.D. specializing in Canadian church history. Her dissertation dealt with the Moravian and Anglican missions in Canada's Arctic.

Adam Gacek, a native of Poland, received his M.A. in Oriental Philology from the Jagiellonian University, Cracow, and subsequently a post-graduate diploma in Library Science from the Polytechnic of North London. He worked at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, and the Institute of Ismaili Studies, London, and is the author of two catalogues of Arabic manuscripts produced for the above institutions. He joined McGill University in 1987 where he occupies the position of Head Librarian in the Islamic Studies Library.

Frances Groen is Life Sciences Area Librarian, McGill University. She received her undergraduate and library science degrees from the University of Toronto and her M.A. in the History and Philosophy of Science from the University of Pittsburgh. She is currently President-Elect of the Medical Library Association, the first Canadian in more than 50 years to be elected to this office.

John Hobbins obtained his B.A. (Hons. History 1966) and his M.L.S. (1968) from McGill University. Since then he has worked for McGill University Libraries as a Reference Librarian, Instructional Services Librarian, Head of Interlibrary Loans, and Head of Acquisitions, Central Technical Services. His current appointment is as Acting Law Area Librarian. He is a Senior Librarian and former contributor to *Fontanus*.

Raymond Klibansky, born in Paris, obtained a Ph.D. summa cum laude in Philosophy at Heidelberg University and became the youngest member of the Faculty, till the advent of National Socialism forced him to leave Germany for England where he was made M.A. of Oxford University and Lecturer at Oriel College. After his war service as Chief Intelligence Officer, he became Director of Studies at the Warburg Institute, University of London, and, in 1946, Frothingham Professor of Logic and Metaphysics at McGill University. An Emeritus Professor since 1975, he was made Fellow of Wolfson College and Hon. Fellow of Oriel College, Oxford University. From 1966-69 he was President of the Institut International de Philosophie, Paris, and since then Hon. President. He is also Hon. President of the Société Internationale pour l'Étude de la Philosophie Médiévale and of the Canadian Society for the History and Philosophy of Science which he founded in 1956. He was awarded an Hon, D. Phil. by both the University of Marburg and the University of Ottawa, and made an Hon. Senator by the University of Heidelberg. He is the only Canadian member of the Italian National Academy and a Fellow of several other Italian and German Academies as well as of the American Academy of Science and Letters. His bibliography is published in two volumes of essays in his honour, Revue internationale de philosophie 29 (Brussels 1975) and Reason, Action and Experience (Hamburg 1979).

Richard Virr is the Manuscript Curator, Department of Rare Books and Special Collections, McGill University Libraries. He holds a doctorate in Church History from McGill (1980). Before joining the Library, he was with the McGill University Archives and the Archives of the Anglican Diocese of Montreal.

Bruce Whiteman, Head of the Department of Rare Books and Special Collections, holds an M.A. in English Literature (1977) and an M.L.S. (1979) from the University of Toronto. He has published widely on Canadian literature and bibliography, and is, as well, a poet and book-reviewer. He is currently the editor of the *Papers of the Bibliographical Society of Canada*, and is working on an edition of the letters of Montreal writer and editor John Sutherland (1919-56). His new book of poetry, *The Invisible World is in Decline*, Books II-IV, has just been published by Coach House Press (1989).
